What if ...?

Aim

To practise zero conditionals

Materials

One copy of the sheet per group of three or four students

Time

25 minutes

Preparation

Copy the sheet as above and cut it into 30 cards

Procedure

- 1 Pre-teach any unknown vocabulary (e.g. a queue, to leave a note, to remind someone).
- 2 Divide the class into groups of three or four students.
- 3 Give each group a set of 30 cards (ten questions each cut into three parts).
- 4 Students work together to match the three parts of each question. Give them an example if necessary.
- 5 In groups, students discuss the answers to the questions.

Alternatives

- Begin by giving students just the first part of the questions (the if clause) and let them discuss possible endings before handing out the endings to match.
- Divide the slips of paper between students, up to three each, mixing
 if clauses and endings. Students then do a walkabout, trying to trade
 their endings to make complete questions.

Extension

Writing: Students write further questions.

TEACHER'S NOTES

CONDITIONALS RACE

Materials: One copy of the board and a dice or coin per group and one counter per student

Arrange Ss into groups of three (or groups of four if you have a large class) and give each group a board (A3 size if possible), a dice or coin and a counter for each student. If Ss use a coin, they move one space for heads and two spaces for tails.

Tell Ss to put their counters on the START square and to take it in turns to move around the board.

If Ss land on a square with a sentence, they must finish the sentence correctly with true information about themselves. If Ss don't finish the sentence correctly, they move back to the square they came from. If Ss land on a free square, they don't do anything. The winner is the first player to reach the FINISH square.

While Ss are playing the game, go round and help, correcting/adjudicating where necessary.
