Activity type: information gap

When to use: Use this activity after Lesson 12.3.

Time: 25 minutes


Preparation: Photocopy and cut up one card for each student and one family tree for each

pair of students.


Procedure

Put students into pairs. Give half the pairs a Student A worksheet and the other half a Student B worksheet. Tell students to choose the correct word to complete the sentences.

Then rearrange the class so that a Student A works with a Student B. Give each pair a copy of the family tree. Tell students to take turns to read out their sentences and to work together to complete the family tree. Tell students not to show their worksheets to each other.

- Adam's wife is either/both Louisa or Anna.
- 2 Neither/Either Martin nor David is married they're both single.
- 3 Martin is older than both/either his brother and his sister.
- 4 Neither/Both of Jack's sisters are as young as him: he's the youngest in the family.
- 5 The name of Boris's wife is either/both Barbara or Zara.

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A pairwork activity for SS to practise using both, neither, and either. Copy one sheet per pair.


Has/Have either of them got a coat? No, neither of them have./Yes, both of them have. Yes, one of them has.

- I Get SS to sit in pairs face to face. Give out the copies to A and B and give them a minute to look at the pictures and read their instructions.
- Demonstrate the activity. Get one A to choose two women. Ask him/her a few questions, focusing on the kinds of questions in the LANGUAGE box. (Has either of them got a coat? etc.) to try to identify them. Elicit correct answers from A, e.g. No, neither of them have./Yes, one of them has. When SS have got the idea, they do the same in pairs.
- 2 When B guesses the two women A has chosen, they swap roles. They should swap roles at least three times.

Note:

With neither / either you can use a singular or plural verb (e.g. have or has).
