

QUESTION AND ANSWER MATCHING

Use after: Lesson 1

Interaction: groups of three **Time:** about 20 minutes

Materials: one photocopy for every three students, cut into strips

Instructions:

- Divide the class into groups of three.
- 2 Give out a set of the cut-up questions and answers to each group and ask them to mix them up.
- 3 Ask them to match the questions with the correct answers.
- 4 When everyone has finished, get whole-class feedback. Check that students have matched the questions and answers correctly. Ask individual students in turn to read out the questions. Ask other students in the class to call out the correct answer. The rest of the class should listen and say whether the answer is correct or not.
- 5 Back in their groups, ask students to lay out the question cards only, face down on the table.
- 6 Explain that they should take turns to turn over a card and answer the question on that card about themselves. They should continue taking turns until all of the cards have been used. Monitor round the class.
